

# STORY OF HOPE

Lontana native Evan U. came to Bend because a friend offered him a place to stay while he looked for work that could take advantage of his experience with sales in the insurance and auto fields. The place to stay didn't work out and none of the jobs Evan found paid anywhere near enough to afford a decent place to live. Money ran out and Evan ended up sleeping in his car. He ran into someone at a Bend park who told him about Bethlehem Inn. Evan says, "The Inn was clean and well-run. Case managers didn't wait for you to come to them. They approached you with an attitude that said, 'Let us help you figure your challenges out.' The Inn is light years ahead of other shelters where I've been."

Evan talks about things at the Inn that many folks who aren't homeless take for granted: a clean, comfortable, safe and structured environment." While staying at the Inn, Evan worked different jobs and saved money thanks to being able to stay at the Inn.

He eventually saved enough to head home to Montana where he now works full time in the forensic mental health unit of a state-run hospital. Evan makes no bones about the fact that Bethlehem Inn was there for him at a point in his life when he needed it most.



#### Choices.

Fourteen years ago, I walked into Bethlehem Inn seeking a volunteer position to feel more involved in our community, never realizing what an impact it would have on me. Immediately, I saw how the entire staff accepted and assisted the residents, no judgment involved, just helping them take charge of their lives and get on a healthy path.

The main lesson I've learned from the shelter is that we all are constantly making choices, and those choices are often based on what we were taught growing up.

One morning as I was working at the front desk, a guy was teaching a *Ready to Rent* class to some residents in the adjacent dining room. He started by asking for examples of what was an important thing that the residents had to buy. "Gotta get 5 lottery tickets every Saturday" said one of the residents, hopeful for a solution to his current financial hardships. Without skipping a beat, the instructor responded with empathy "I see this is important to you... let's figure out how much money you'd save in a year buying fewer tickets."

And so they did. Together.

So much respect, non-judgment, accepting another's values that might not match your own while gently reinforcing positive lifestyle changes. And that's what I'm taught every time I volunteer at Bethlehem Inn. Common knowledge is not necessarily common; we all learn different life lessons, like how to handle money, or how to control our emotions, or how we decide to navigate difficult life circumstances. Choices.

Residents choose to come to Bethlehem Inn to get that help to get back on an independent path. The incredible staff provides the knowledge to make informed choices, and accepts those that choose to take the path less traveled.

And I choose to remain a part of this team as long as they'll have me.

ebruary was the month of compassion. Schools from around Central Oregon came together to make a difference in their community. Support was seen from Terrebonne Community School, to St. Thomas Academy, to Bend International School. Every school found a unique way to support the most vulnerable in the community.

Bend International School students, our neighbors, focused their efforts on actualizing compassion. Each grade from the school combined their efforts to make nine unique works of art (kindergarten-8th grade). Now the Inn's cafeteria is exploding with color and compassion.

Later that month first graders from Maestra Tere's class (pictured right) surprised us with a food drive they'd completed. Working together, they collected dozens of bags of fresh fruit, hygiene supplies, and pantry staples. In-kind donations like this one help Bethlehem Inn provide three nutritious meals every day for up to two hundred residents.











Engaging with youth provides an opportunity to demystify and remove much of the fear that surrounds houselessness. Over the past year, Bethlehem Inn has been engaging schools around Central Oregon and inviting them to *be part of the solution*.

**Terrebonne Community School** kindergarten class (above middle) worked together to collect canned food, and then made a poster of all of participating students. The kindergartners would later visit Bethlehem Inn Redmond, talk to staff, and tour the kitchen where they could see their donations put to use by other volunteers.

**St. Thomas Academy** of Redmond (below) raised over \$2000 with a *spare change drive* over the winter months. Hundreds of students searched the deep recesses of their living room couches to make a difference in their community.

**Redmond Proficiency Academy** High School has been helping make freezer meals for our residents since last November. This spring their middle school jumped in to make chili and chicken tortellini for the Redmond Bethlehem Inn.
